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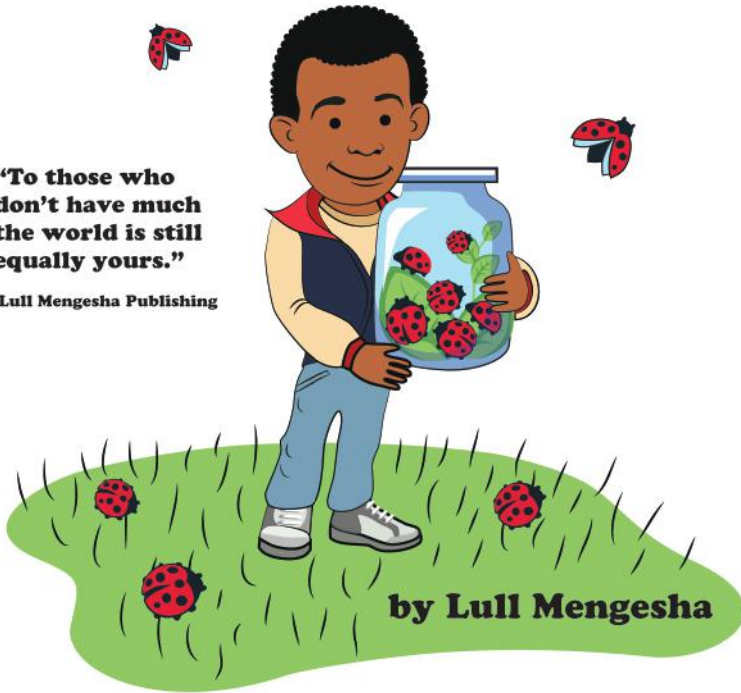

The neighbor takes a deep breath and explains, “Your mother and I don’t have much money. So we trade to get what we want like when you and your friends trade for Silly Bands.”

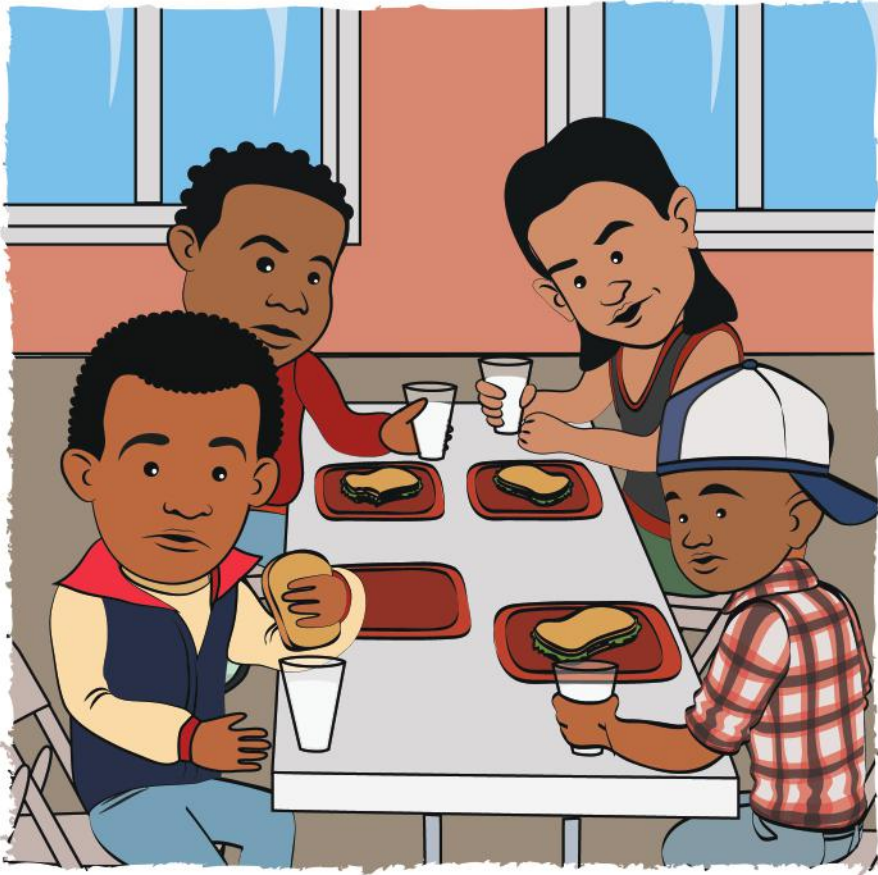

in agreement.

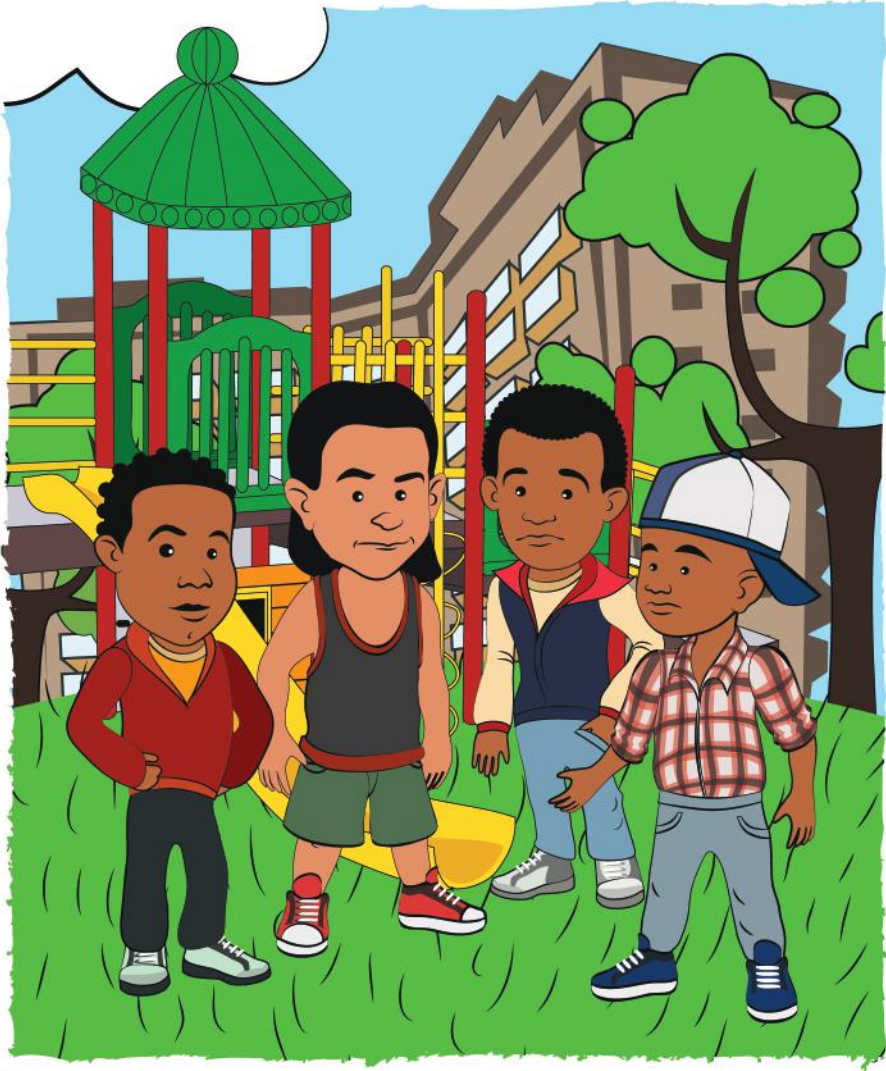
“Let’s ask our moms to buy them for us at

“I don’t know yet,” whispers Lull, “but we will have to look around and find things that our classmates want.”

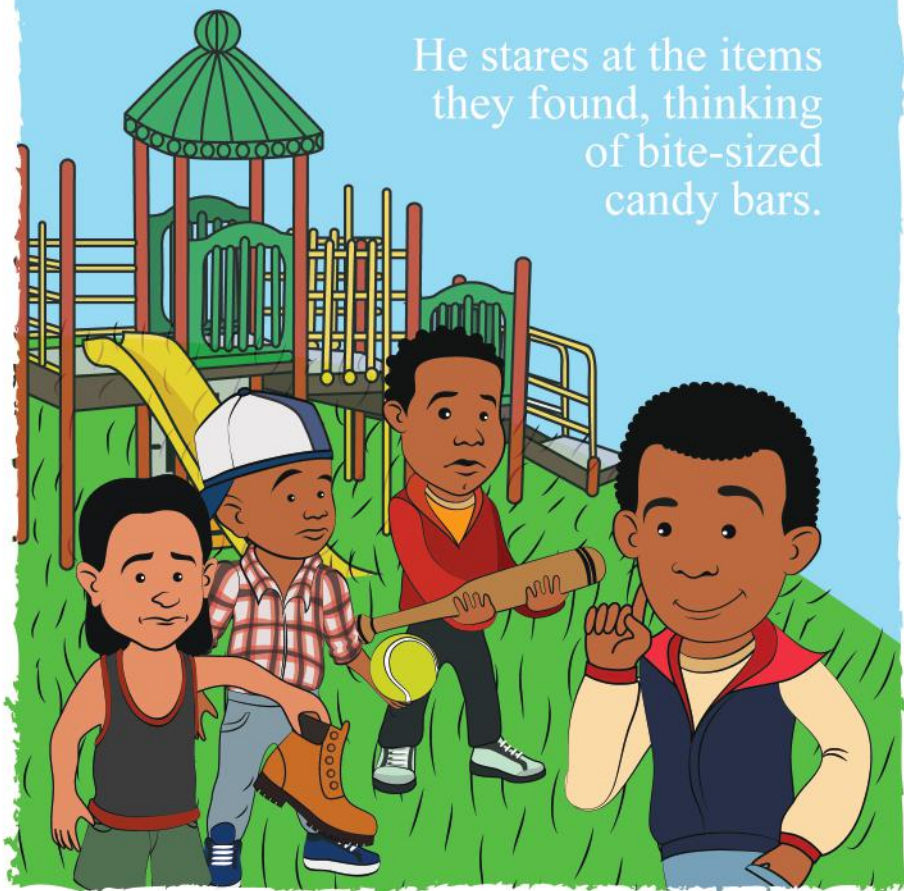
“I don’t have anything to trade,” Aaron replies.

“The little kids?” asks Khasha.

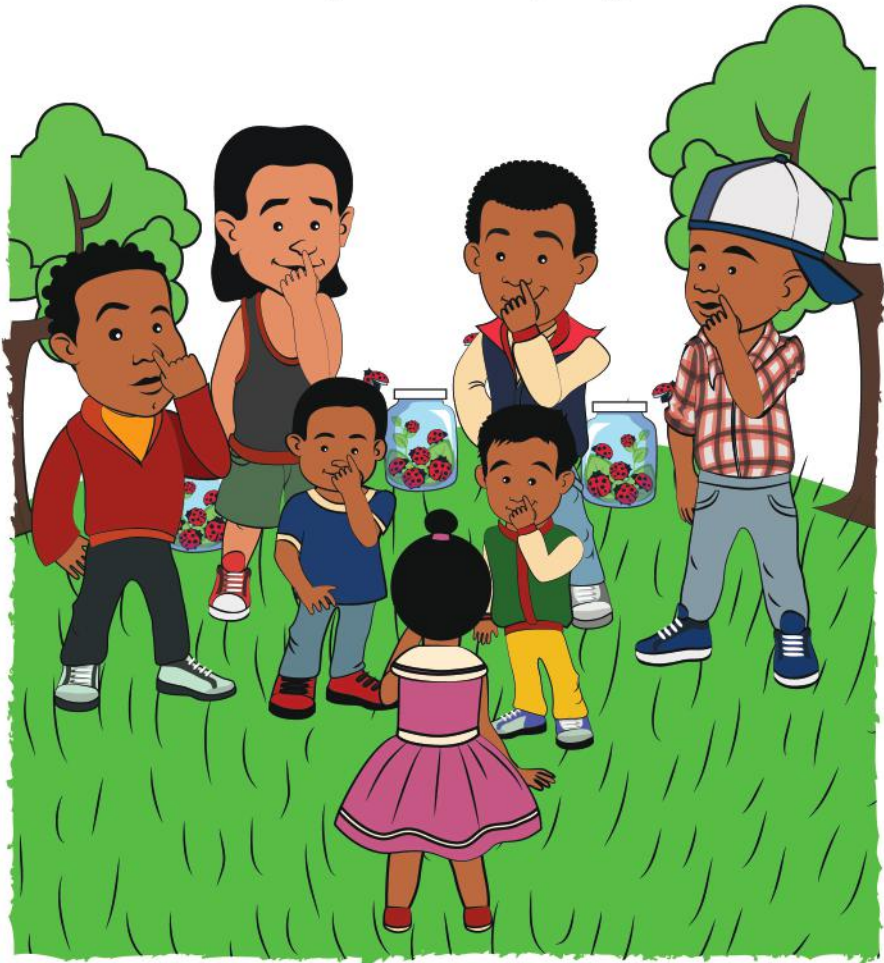
“No, silly. Ladybugs!” says Lull.

says Aaron.

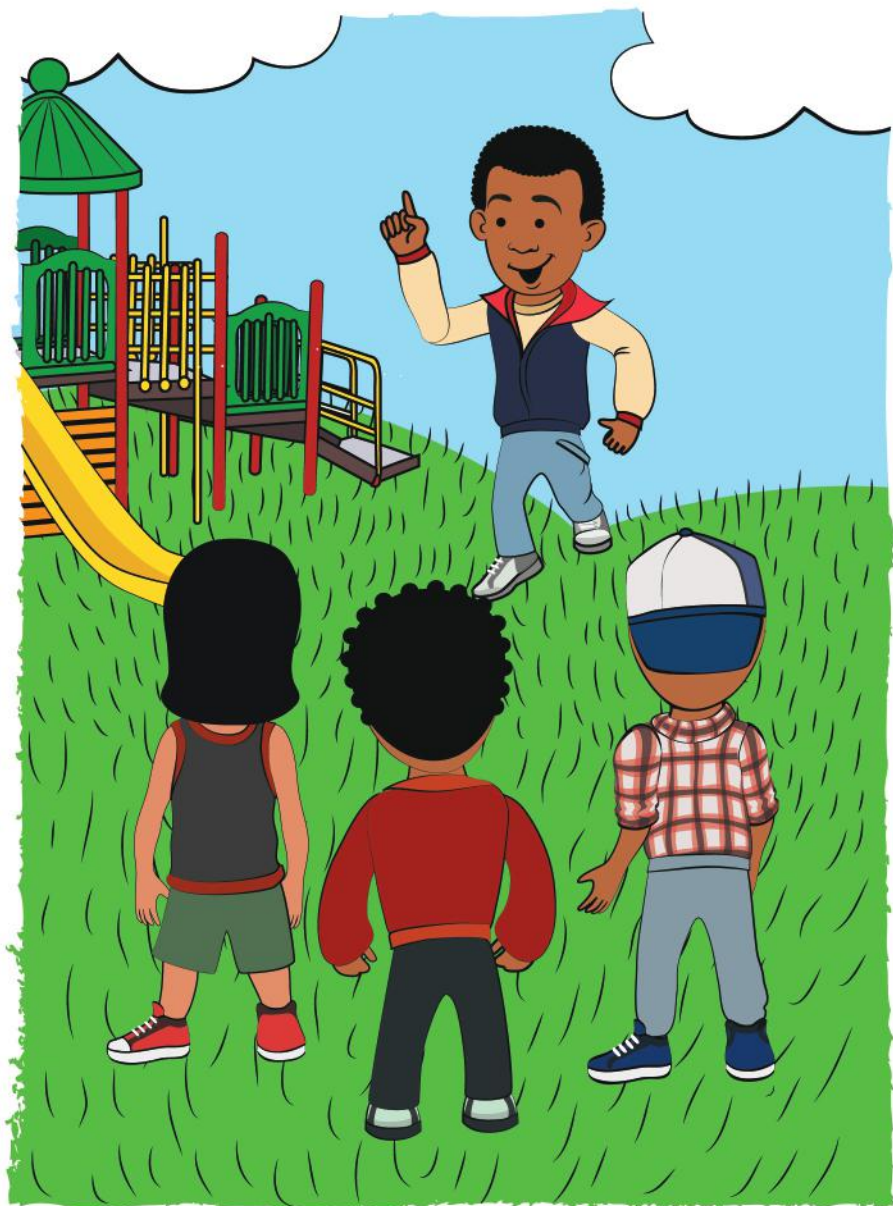
“I like the sound of that!” responds Lull.
