“Interesting,” said Lungisa.

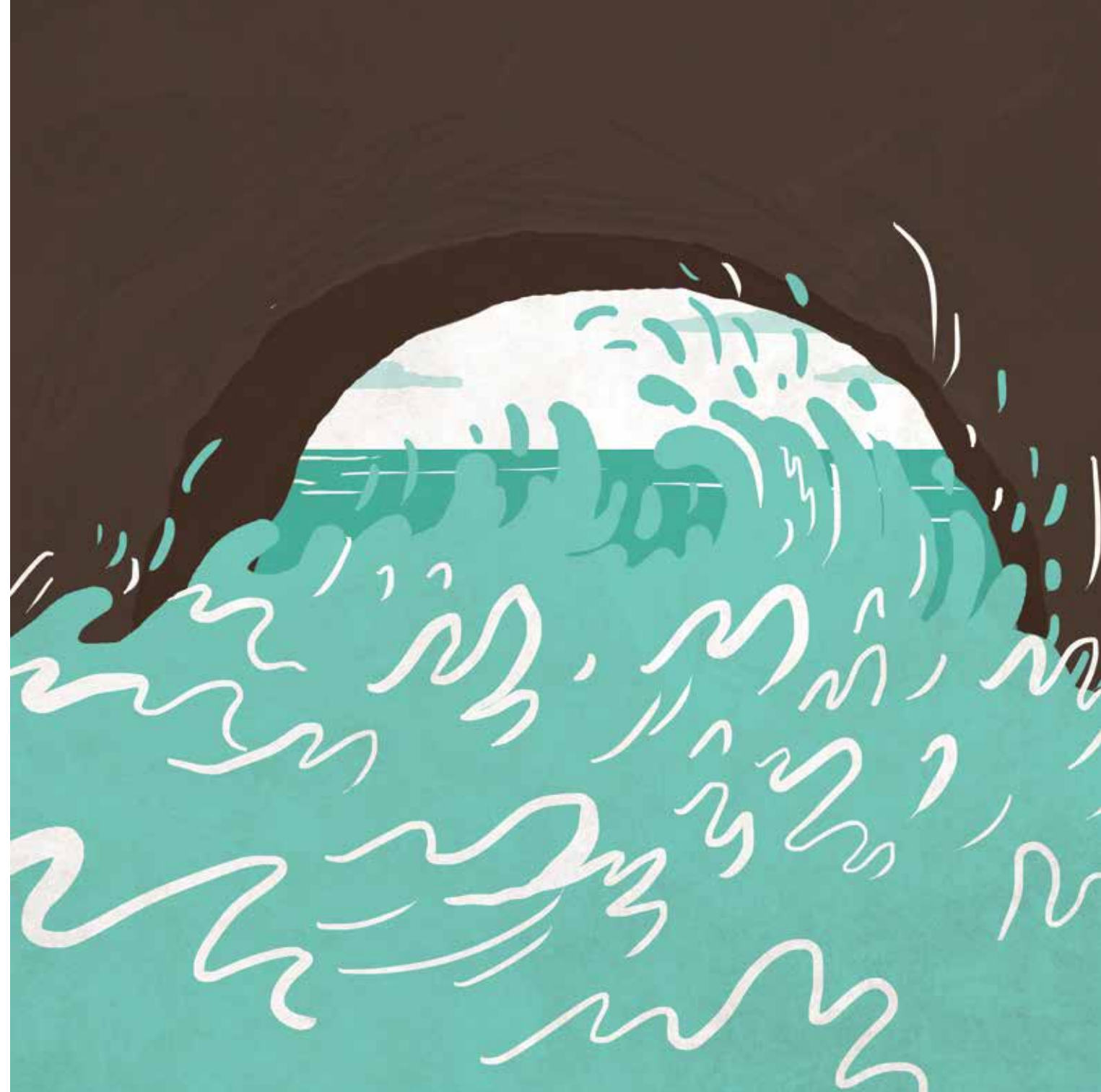






“Why is there a hole in the wall?”

And Lungisa laughed.



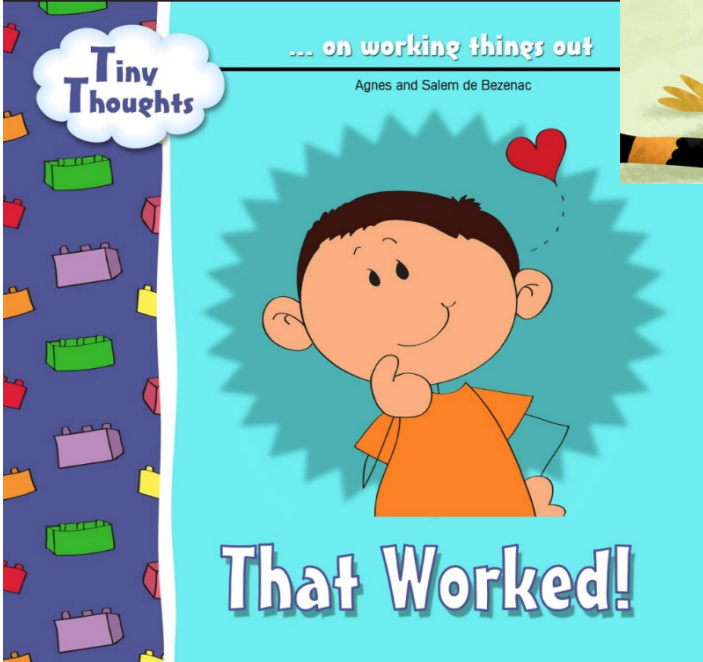
But he kept on asking.
