




I can only spell it because she gave me this sweet pin.


That's another perk to being a feminist.


You get a badge! Just like the hall monitors in school.




And it's kinda like being a hall monitor, too.


It's your job to stand up when you see people not treating others right.












As feminists, we only use that superpower with great responsibility.

I felt it, first, at recess.




Me, Sadie, Rose, and Chance were playing cheer which is when you do

And the other person stands on top with their hands up


Also someone stands behind to make sure you don't fall backwards,

came up and asked if we would cheer for their football game




I didn't want to because it meant I wouldn't get my chance to fly since two

and you can't do a stunt with just two people. But everyone


else wanted to so I was outvoted.

Sam didn't like that.







She said that she played football at home all the time


with her dad and sisters.

He had never seen a girl play football before.








Right then I got busy thinking of what I could say.

I didn't know what to do or say!




That's when J.D. said that he thinks anyone who loves football

J.D. wasn't phased at all.









And they both laughed like life long buddies. After that everyone including me, wanted to cheer
