nice nap in the sun.

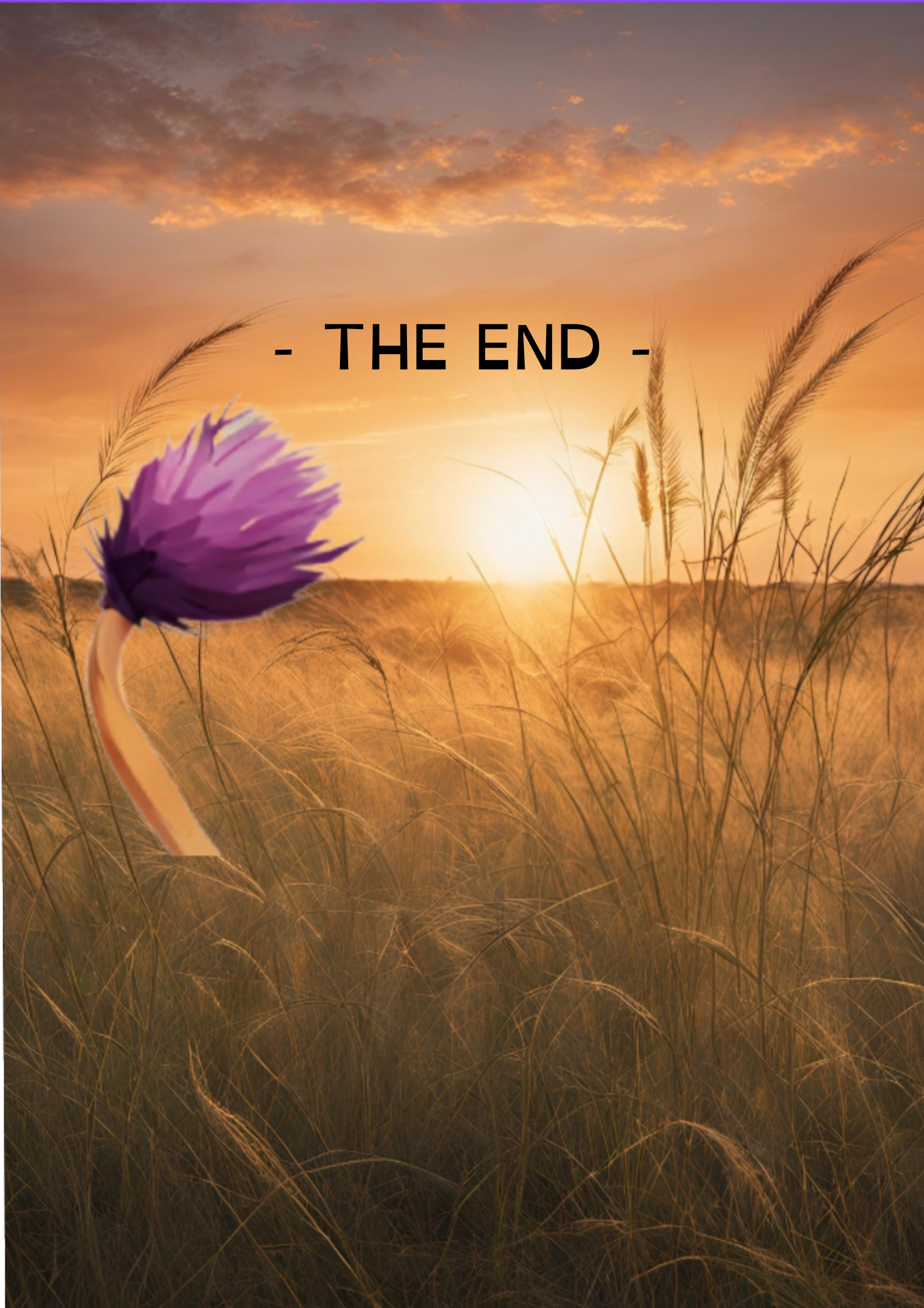
This is Eleonora and the pride napping:
